HAD A SOLDIER'S FUNERAL

HUNDREDS PAY TRIBUTE TO GEN. DURYEE'S MEMORY.

THERE WAS AN ATTENDANCE OF MILITARY MEN ALMOST WITHOUT PRECEDENT IN THIS CITY.

Seldom in the history of the city of New-York has a more truly representative assemblage been gathered together than that which attended the funeral services of Gen. Abram Duryée in the Church of the Holy Trinity, Lenox Avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-second Street, yesterday. The attendance of military men intent on honoring his memory was almost without precedent on any similar occasion. The Seventh Regiment sent an almost solid delegation, headed by Gen. Emmons Clark. The veterans of the regiment were also largely represented, their principal officers and adherents finding place among the group of pallbearers. These were composed of Col. Daniel Appleton, Gen. Floyd Clarkson, Gen. Henry F. Tremain, Gen. Hiram Duryea, Col. Edward M. Crawford, Col. William H. Biblett, Col. Locke W. Winchester, Mr. L. L. S. Clearman, and Mr. Edmund A. Brooks.

The body was conveyed from Gen. Duryée's residence, 86 West One Hundred and Twenty-sixth Street, to the church, preceded by the pallbearers in carriages. At the church the customary services of the Episcopal Church were held, including the recital of the appointed burial office, in which the Rev. George R. Van De Water, rector of St. Andrew's; the Rev. E. H. Cleveland, assistant minister of St. Andrew's, and the Rev. I. N. Stunger, rector of Holy Trinity, took part. The anthem "Lord, Let Me Know My End and the Number of My Days," was chanted by the quartet of the choir, which also led in the singing of the congregational hymns, "Abide with Me," and "Jesus, Lover of My Soul." A brief address was delivered by the Rev. Dr. Van De Water.

The interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, in the family plot, just opposite Battle Hill. Here the Second Company of the Seventh Regiment, under command of Capt. Daniel H. Nesbitt, was in waiting, the company of which Gen. Duryée had originally been the head in the Twenty-seventh Regiment. After the recital of the committal office by the Rev. Mr. Briggs, a son-in-law of Gen. Duryée, three volleys were fired by Capt. Nesbitt's company, the services being concluded by the sounding of the impressive "Good Night" by a United States Army bugler.
